Pastor's Corner

Dear Beloved Parishioners,

In the midst of despair and hopeless and in the midst of abandonment and fear, God does something unexpected for the grieving and mourning mother in today's gospel passage. God has visited her. In this visit by God who comes in the person of Jesus, so much is revealed. We come to realize that the God we believe in is a God who cares for his people. Our God is a kind and merciful God. He does not allow the mother to live in dire straits. By raising the son from the dead, Jesus gives back her son so that she can once again be taken care of by her son. Otherwise, the mother most likely would have lived the rest of her life on the fringe of society.

Jesus comes to visit us as well. God comes to be with us. He comes when we least expect him, but when we seem to need him the most. He comes to us in a friend who we have not heard from in quite awhile to console us in the loss of a spouse or family member. He comes to us in a priest who comes to bring communion and to anoint us whenever we are in a hospital or at home. He comes to us in the kindness of a stranger who helps us in our time of need. He comes to us in a colleague who supports us with encouraging words especially when work is overwhelming.

With and through eyes of faith, do we come to recognize the good Lord when he comes to visit us. Whenever we experience the trials and tribulations of life, open the eyes of your heart to see that God is already there. He lifts our spirits and his words give life to us. May we always believe in our hearts that God is with us.

What We Believe

The Mixing of Water and Wine

My love of cooking probably stems from childhood memories of big family dinners and my love of wine probably stems from when Nonno said to me "Milk is for babies!" and mixed a couple of table-spoons of his red wine into a glass of water for my Sunday dinner beverage. The mixing of wine and water at Mass originates from the same custom of diluting wine with water done in both secular and religious settings at the time of the first Christians.

In the ancient world, the Greeks added water to wine because it was often thick, gritty, and too strong. It was simply good taste to add water to wine before drinking it. The Romans loved all things Greek, so they adopted Greek manners and spread them to the lands they conquered. And even though it was not originally a Jewish custom to add water to wine, it soon became part of the Passover meal itself and, hence, part of our Mass. We can assume that Jesus did it at the Last Supper.

St. Cyprian of Carthage, (200-210 C. E.) admonished those who chose to use water only at Mass, stating: "...we see that the water stands for the people whereas the wine stands for the Blood of Christ.

When water is united with the wine in the cup, the people are made one with Christ; the believing people are united and joined with him in whom they believe" (Letter 63). As early as the fourth century, catechists explained that the water represented humanity and the wine, divinity. Once you put the water into the wine, it's impossible to take it out again. Because of Jesus, humanity can never again be separated permanently from God. The symbolic mixing of water with the sacramental wine serves to remind us that Jesus, fully human and fully divine, has united himself with us forever.
